Helping Hands of Franklin County

St. Peter's Outreach focus for July-September is Helping Hands of Franklin County. Helping Hands of Franklin County's mission is to provide emergency financial assistance to help meet the needs of Franklin County citizens.

Is Helping Hands a new organization? Helping Hands was incorporated as a 501(c) (3) non-profit agency November 14, 1994. Its founder, Thomas K. Boyle, served as Director from that date until November, 2001, when Sam Campbell succeeded him. Our Director as of 2018 is Kay Saleeby.

Who works at Helping Hands? Helping Hands is staffed by volunteer citizens of Franklin County and is governed by a Board of Directors representing a cross section of business and professional individuals living and working in the County. Over the years, Helping Hands has provided financial assistance and counseling for thousands of county residents who found themselves needing emergency aid.

What are typical emergency expenses?

- electric bill termination notices
- rent or mortgage issues
- heating fuel
- prescription medication
- other emergency needs

Do clients get a blank check? We never write checks to clients. Funds are paid directly to whom the money is owed. At the moment our maximum help is \$200.00, which is often supplemented by other agencies, especially the Salvation Army. We will see a client (or their immediate family members) only once every 18 months. If we cannot cover a bill, the client must cover the remainder before we will pay our part.

What else happens? In addition, we provide financial counseling to each client. We also reach out or provide information to other organizations if the client needs other services. We treat our clients with dignity and respect.

Where do funds come from?

- Individual donations
- Contributions from churches and civic clubs
- Franklin County Board of Supervisors
- Town of Rocky Mount
- Grants and fund-raising efforts
- Smith Mountain Lake Charity Home Tour (when eligible and selected)

Sally works at a local fast food restaurant. When we met Sally she was living in her car. She was working full time and trying to save up enough money to rent a small house in Boones Mill. Sally had enough money for the rent but not the down payment. She just couldn't swing it. We called the landlord and made arrangements for us to pay her downpayment. We reached out to a local church and one of our donors to cover her bill. Sally was overcome with gratitude and cried many joyful tears when we told her the downpayment was covered. Sally was known to Helping Hands staff, who knew that her mother died when she was young and that Sally had basically raised herself. There was always a lot of anger in Sally as a young child, but she was out there trying to make it on her own. We gave her a chance to live in a decent place and to continue to feel some pride that she was making it.

Mary came into our office with a bandage around her neck. You could see that there was a cut under the bandage. Without going into too much detail, Mary was in a very abusive relationship. Her boyfriend is now in jail and Mary needed help with her electric bill. After she was attacked by her boyfriend, she had a heart attack. She works full time, but the doctor has not released her to go back to her job. Mary was behind on her AEP bill and with the help of the Salvation Army and a nearby church we were able to pay her termination bill and bring her up to date. Mary is now in a safe location and hopefully will continue in a more stable life.

1) Charity Home Tour Volunteers:

Dates and times available are Oct. 6 or 7 morning 9:15 am to 1:30 pm or afternoon 12:15-5:00 pm, and Oct. 8 afternoon 12:15-5:00 pm.

2) Volunteer intake interviewers:

Helping Hands volunteer staff interview clients to help determine their eligibility. Volunteers attend training, observe an experienced volunteer and conduct at least one interview with staff support before working on their own. Volunteers may also act in a receptionist role at the front desk.

Volunteers schedule themselves based on their availability. Schedules are posted monthly and there are no minimum hours required. Helping Hands conducts interviews only on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 9:00 am-noon.




