

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Meet the Campbells

This is the story of Helen and Sam Campbell, who have been members of Saint Peters-in-the-Mountains for four years before moving to an assisted living facility in Roanoke, Virginia.

Helen Campbell was born in 1935, the sixth of seven children to James and Helen Patterson. She grew up in Norfolk, Virginia, attending and graduating from Granby High School in 1952. Helen went on to the College of William & Mary, graduating in 1956 with a bachelor's degree in English Education and a minor in Social Studies.



Helen began her teaching career at Northside Junior High School in the Tidewater area, teaching English, Social Studies and Math. She moved back to Williamsburg in 1957, then to Alexandria in 1961. It was here that she ran into a lean, lanky man named Sam Campbell.

Sam had come to Alexandria at the request of his Uncle Clay Estes, to interview for a teaching position. Uncle Clay was just six years older than Sam, and was the person who eventually introduced Helen and Sam.

Sam and Helen's first date was a high school football game, then went to Hot Shoppe, a chain of casual drive-in diner style restaurants that started in the late 1920s in the Washington, DC area, and expanded over the next 40 years. Sam and Helen talked until 3:00 a.m., and the two visited several times the following week, prompting Sam's roommate to say "If you go over one more time, it's over."

Sam did in fact go over that one more time, and the couple was eventually married in June 1962 by Sam's father Dr. Thomas Campbell a Presbyterian minister.

Sam was born in Nashville, Tennessee, in 1936, the second of four children to Thomas and Margaret (Estes). The family moved to Texas when Sam was just a baby. Dad worked as a minister in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church Publishing House, editing church journals. The family moved to Texas in 1937, eventually spending a few months in a small town in 1942 called Mount Selman.

Sam describes Mount Selman as a "rough town". Mount Selman Elementary School had eight grades, but only four teachers to cover those, and no indoor plumbing. Sam and his friends used to go down to the outhouses to use the facilities and to the janitor's well to get a drink of water, where kids would be unsupervised for small blocks of time. It was here that Sam learned to cuss with the best of them. He even tried smoking, but after almost getting sick the first time, he decided to find another hobby. Apparently, having your face turn green does that to a kid.

In 1943, the family moved to McKenzie, Tennessee, located two hours northwest of Memphis, where his dad became the acting administrator (President) of Bethel College and Dean of Cumberland Presbyterian Theological Seminary. The school that would eventually become Memphis Theological Seminary in the mid-1960s.

Sam attended McKenzie High School, where he played basketball and graduated in 1953. His sophomore year, the basketball team posted a "perfect" 0-23 record.

Sam went on to attend Bethel College in McKenzie, where his dad was on the faculty so he got free tuition. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in Health & Physical Education in 1957. He played two years of B team basketball at Bethel and three years of varsity baseball as a first baseman.

It was at the end of Sam's junior year at Bethel that his coaching career began when he got a call from a local school Medina High School, who asked him to coach the boys and girls basketball teams. Sam was rolling in the big bucks now, earning \$2080 for 10 months of work. After taxes, Sam took home \$182 per month.

Medina was a cotton-picking community, where there were no classes for 4-6 weeks in the fall while the students would help pick cotton. Sam would coach the kids at night, after they had finished picking.

Sam began work on his master's degree in 1957 at Memphis State College (now University of Memphis). He earned his M.Ed. in Administration and Supervision in the spring of 1959. After two years at Medina, Sam moved back to McKenzie, where he coached the boys' basketball team and was an assistant coach for the football team for three seasons each.

Sam's Uncle Clay, mentioned earlier, had moved to Alexandria, and was the boys'

basketball coach at George Washington High School. Uncle Clay convinced Sam to apply for a job there, which he did. Sam never interviewed and was offered the job as a World History teacher (which scared Sam to death) and JV boys' basketball coach. At the end of Sam's first year, the school principal offered Sam a position in the P.E. department. Sam turned it down and remained as world history teacher for 17 years.

Sam took a position there as JV boys' basketball coach at George Washington High School in Alexandria, Maryland, in 1961, where he coached the team for four. His team posted a four-year record of 76-6, and included a 48-game win streak with Sam as coach.

Sam was named boys' basketball coach and chair of the History Department when T.C. Williams High School opened in 1965. If that sounds familiar to you, it's because the school was famously portrayed in the 2000 movie, *Remember the Titans*. T.C. Williams won the 1971 Virginia High School League football state title, and Sam remembers attending a few of those games.

Helen says it was thrilling to watch Sam coach basketball back then, and that he was also an excellent teacher. And apparently, opposing coaches said Helen had rabbit ears.

Helen got pregnant with their first child and stopped teaching after eight years in the classroom. David was born in 1965, then Kate in 1968. The family moved to Springfield in 1968, about 15 minutes away, then back to Alexandria in 1973.

In the fall of 1971, Sam stopped coaching to pursue his doctorate at George Washington University. He earned his Doctor of Education in Administration and Curriculum in 1977.

Sam, Helen and the kids moved to Rocky Mount in 1978, where Sam became the Assistant Principal at Franklin County High School that fall. Sam was pleased with the position, no discipline or maintenance like at previous schools he worked at. At FCHS, he was able to just focus on working with teachers and counselors.

Helen decided to go back to work, but could not work as a teacher under Sam so she took a position in Marketing and Distributive Education, when she did for 18 months. She eventually accepted a position in Adult Education.







Sam was named principal at Burnt Chimney Elementary School in 1983 and Helen would join the faculty as an English teacher at Franklin County High School, a position she held from 1983-90 before retiring.

Sam was asked by Leonard Gereau in 1986 to take the principal position at Franklin County Middle School. The school had a second building added, sixth-grade students were included, which alleviated pressure on sizes at the county's elementary schools. The school eventually became what is now Benjamin Franklin Middle School.

He accepted and held that post from 1986-90. Sam spent the next year, 1990-91, in Franklin

County's central office as Director of Secondary Education, then retired June 1991.

After retiring in 1991, Sam would interview for and accept a middle school principal position in Andover, Massachusetts, where he worked until 1995. When they returned to Virginia, Helen wanted to live in Williamsburg, but real estate there had become exorbitant, so they came back to Franklin County.

Sam would eventually take a position with STEP Program's Project Discovery in 1996, eventually becoming Assistant Director at STEP.

Upon their return to Franklin County, Helen became active with the Episcopal Church at the Diocesan level, attending Trinity in Rocky Mount. The Campbells joined St. Peters after getting to know Rev. John Heck. Helen became active with Daughters of the King Ministry, a Christ-Centered community of women seeking inclusive fellowship. Sam and Helen have sung together for years at church choirs and community choruses.

Sam and Helen are the proud grandparents of five grandchildren. Kate has a daughter, Sarah, while Dave has a son Seijin and three daughters, Sayda, Yulliana and Laissa.

David taught media courses and was advisor of the *Eagle Newspaper* at Franklin County High School, and now is on the faculty at Ferrum College and the advisor of Ferrum's school newspaper *The Iron Blade*. Kate currently works in the Human Resources Office at Carilion in Roanoke.

Sam wrote and self-published a book in 2020 called *Over the Garage is Out ... A Book of Vignettes and Memoirs.* The title of the book referred to childhood ball games where if you hit the ball over the garage, you were out.

Sam and Helen lived in Rocky Mount after returning from Massachusetts, then moved to a cozy home on the west side of Ferrum. The couple now resides in Roanoke and attend St. James Episcopal Church in downtown Roanoke. The two recently celebrated their 60th anniversary.
